
Early Days

- It all started in the mid1960's, when Ron and Jay were both stationed at CSIRO's 64 metre Radio Telescope at Parkes under the auspices of John Bolton. I joined the Receiver group in 1965 working for Brian Cooper and spent long periods at Parkes installing receivers.
- When I initially met Jay, my first impressions were of a young, intelligent lady who looked to have impeccable taste.
- Alas this proved to be entirely incorrect, as I later found out she was married to Ron!

After leaving Parkes in 1967, he spent the next 20 years at Caltech, the Institute of Theoretical astronomy in Cambridge, the Kapetyn Lab in Groningen, Netherlands and finally to NRAO in the USA where he served as Director of the VLA (1980-87).

- In the meantime, I found myself working on a CSIRO microwave aircraft landing system called "Interscan" for several years. I then took "Leave of Absence" from CSIRO and went to work for NRAO in Greenbank, West Virginia before returning to Australia to resume work on receivers for the Parkes Radio telescope.
- Our paths finally crossed again in the mid 1980's when I was the Project Manager for the AT construction phase and Ron served on the Steering Committee.

ATNF construction phase

- As a member of our Steering Committee Ron was invaluable with his insights on the requirements for National Facilities.
- As you are all aware Ron missed out on the "Shrinking Violet" gene, so we all paid <u>very</u> close attention to what he had to say.

A rare photo of the other applicant for the Directors job. It made Bob Frater's selection a bit easier.




As foundation Director of the ATNF:

- Ron was appointed as the ATNF foundation Director in1988 and served in this role till he resigned in 2003.
- One of his initial tasks was to change the ethos of the CSIRO staff from one that "Owned" the Parkes Telescope to that of a group "Operating" a National Facility. Believe me it was no easy feat.
- It was during these initial years that some staff felt that Ron had a short fuse!
- I disagreed entirely because in my opinion he had:

In 1994 CSIRO suffered major budget cuts and Ron immediately cut back on our morning teas. This is the "After" image




Leadership skills

- Ron bought to CSIRO many of the skills he had acquired as VLA Director.
- Firstly he empowered both Observatory sites (Narrabri and Parkes) by rotating our senior management meetings to the Observatories and involving them in the decision making process.
- He introduced survey's for visiting astronomers to measure our performance in such areas as receiver reliability, on-line computing, data reduction software, on site accommodation, etc. etc.
- Secondly he spoke regularly to all staff informing them of what our gaols were for the upcoming period.
- As a spectator it was obvious to me, that when he spoke <u>all</u> <u>levels of staff listened</u>. This was quite a change from the usual sermons delivered by senior management. <u>Bob Frater excluded</u>.
- When CSIRO introduced staff surveys to measure morale, it was no surprise that out of 22 Divisions, the ATNF staff morale results topped the list, year after year.
